Your spouse is a grown adult who should be able to take care of themselves.God's covenants with humans have a way out, meaning they can be broken and don't guarantee a permanently binding nature. This is seen in Genesis 9, where God promises not to destroy all living things in a flood, but doesn't exclude other ways of destroying them. In Genesis 15, God's covenant with Abraham seems unconditional at first, but later conditions are revealed that make the promise valid only if Abraham and his descendants keep their part of the deal.A similar conditional covenant is seen in Genesis 17, where God tells Abraham to walk before him faithfully and be blameless, or else the covenant will be broken. These human covenants can't have a permanently binding nature because humans are not all-knowing like God, and can't control every aspect of a promise.God's everlasting covenants, on the other hand, are based on His omniscience (all-knowing) and ability to make promises that will ultimately be kept. An example is seen in Genesis 15, where God knows that Abraham's descendants will return to him and keep their part of the covenant. This makes God's promise everlasting.Another important lesson from Genesis 15 is that a couple can separate without breaking their covenant. The covenant remains valid even if one partner breaks it, as long as the other partner continues to keep their part of the deal. This is seen in Leviticus 26:44, where God says he won't reject or abhor his people for breaking the covenant, but will instead allow them to return and keep their promise.In conclusion, God's covenants with humans are not always unconditional, and can be broken if one partner doesn't keep their part of the deal. However, God's everlasting covenants are based on his omniscience and ability to make promises that will ultimately be kept. These covenants require both partners to keep their part of the deal, but also allow for separation and return without breaking the covenant.God makes covenants with his people, promising blessings if they keep their end and consequences if they break it. In Genesis 19, God makes a covenant with the Israelites at Mt Sinai: Now if you obey me fully and keep my covenant, then out of all nations you will be my treasured possession. This is an example of a covenant with 11then statements and terms that must be kept. If they follow Gods commands, he will keep his part of the covenant; if they dont, there are consequences.Leviticus 26 describes the blessings God promises to bestow on his people if they obey: If you follow my decrees and are careful to obey my commands I will look on you with favor and make you fruitful and increase your numbers. However, if they reject Gods laws and fail to carry out all his commands, he will bring disaster on them. This includes sudden terror, wasting diseases, and fever that will destroy their sight and sap their strength.In Deuteronomy 7, God promises to keep his covenant of love with the Israelites if they pay attention to his laws and carefully follow them: If you fully obey the Lord your God and carefully follow all his commands I give you today, then the Lord your God will set you high above all the nations on earth. But if they dont, there are curses that will come on them.The consequences of breaking a covenant can be severe. In Leviticus 26, God says: If after all this they still will not listen to God I will send wild animals against you, and they will rob you of your children, destroy your cattle and make you so few in number that your roads will be deserted. He also threatens to cut off their supply of bread, lay waste the land, and scatter them among the nations.In Deuteronomy 29, God says: All the nations will ask: Why has the Lord done this to his land? Why this fierce, burning anger? And the answer will be: It is because this people abandoned the covenant of the Lord, the God of their ancestors, the covenant he made with them when he brought them out of Egypt. This shows that breaking a covenant can lead to disaster.The New Testament also talks about covenants. This shows that God reconciled us to himself through Jesus blood, but only if we continue in our faith.Hebrews 7 says: Jesus has become the guarantor of a better covenant. The first covenant had regulations for worship because it was necessary for the copies of the heavenly things to be purified with these sacrifices, but the heavenly things themselves with better sacrifices than these. This shows that Jesus is the guarantor of a better covenant.In Deuteronomy 31, God says: You are going to rest with your ancestors, and these people will soon prostitute themselves to the foreign gods of the land they are entering. They will forsake me and break the covenant I made with them. And in that day I will become angry with them and forsake them. This shows what happens when Gods people break their covenant with him.In Deuteronomy 29, it says: When such a person hears the words of this oath and they invoke a blessing on themselves, thinking, I will be safe, even though I persist in going my own way, they will bring disaster on the watered land as well as the dry. The Lord will never be willing to forgive them; his wrath and zeal will burn against them. This shows that assigning a wrong definition to covenant can provide a false sense of security.The New Testament also talks about covenants. But if we deliberately keep on sinning after we have received the knowledge of the truth, no sacrifice for sins is left, but only a fearful expectation of judgment and of raging fire that will consume the enemies of God (Hebrews 10).The first covenant had things that had to be done (regulations) in order to represent what would have to be done under the new covenant, and if we do not comply with the covenant, there will be judgement. (Please note that I mention these verses not because they are referring to apostasy or losing your salvation but, rather, because they are speaking of what happens when a person does not abide by the covenant God makes with us. Id love to say more about this, but it would be too much for this article.)Summary of Biblical CovenantsAs you can see from the above passages, A covenant is not an unconditional promise but, rather, comes with conditions. There are consequences if those conditions are not met.Covenants are not at all about giving up your personal autonomy but, rather, keeping your personal autonomy and authority to enact consequences if the covenant isnt keptIn fact, consequences are the only hope for unityA covenant is also clearly not binding to the extent that it excludes the possibility of divorce [read my article on what divorce really is for a bigger perspective on this]Your Marriage CovenantSo how does this relate to you and the covenant you made when you married your spouse? You said I promise to be faithful - to love, honor, and cherish. And your spouse said I promise to be faithful - to love, honor, and cherish (or some variation of that, but thats the gist of it). If you are keeping your promise and your spouse isnt keeping their promise, the covenant has been broken. If the covenant could be represented by a rope that you are each holding onto, youre standing there holding a broken rope. Your spouse broke the rope. Youre attached to nothing. This is why it doesnt matter if you call marriage a covenant or a contract. It plays out the same. Marriage is a sacred covenant before God. It was first seen in the Garden of Eden between Adam and Eve, in which they became one flesh (Genesis 2:24). Marriages seem to be on the rise today and are popular within the culture. Christian culture especially promotes the idea that all people should get married.Some forms of teaching within churches have stretched the concept of marriage to be a spiritual discipline or even goes to the point of believing one cannot be a spiritually mature Christian if they are not married. But is this true? Does God give the promise of marriage to us in the Bible? What Are Gods Promises?God does not give promises of marriages to us in the Bible. Each of these women did great things for the Lord despite not being married.God does not promise wedding bells for each believer; however, He does give far greater promises in the Bible to us. In the Bible, God promises all believers forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and the indwelling Holy Spirit when they place faith in Jesus death, burial, and resurrection (John 3:16-17).Another promise God gives in the Bible is that as believers, we will never be alone (Hebrews 13:5). God is always there with us, no matter where we go or how old we grow (Deuteronomy 31:8). God is with us through every single second of each day.God also promises to give us rest if we turn to Him (Matthew 11:28-29).
