An Aadhaar card is an important document; however, it cannot be the sole piece of paper. You need other documents, like a voter ID, an electricity bill, a gas bill, a water bill and others, to submit while applying for a passport. How many documents required for passport? Generally, one primary ID proof such as a Voter ID, Aadhaar card, or Driving License is sufficient for a passport application. You may need to provide additional documents like a PAN card or school certificate as supporting proof. What is proof of identity for a passport in India? The acceptable proof of identity for a passport application in India includes government-issued documents such as Aadhaar card, Voter ID, PAN card, Driving License, or any other government-authorized identity card. Secondary proof of citizenship can include early public records and a Letter of No Record. A notarized birth affidavit can serve as proof if completed with personal knowledge of the birth. In most cases, documents serving as "primary" proof of evidence of citizenship are required. Documents serving as primary evidence of U.S. citizenship are: Birth certificate or certified copy of birth certificate issued by a U.S. State or by the U.S. Department of State (for persons born abroad to U.S. citizen parents who registered the child's birth and U.S. citizenship with the U.S. Embassy or consulate) U.S. passport, issued by the U.S. Department of State Certificate of citizenship issued to a person born outside the United States who derived or acquired U.S. citizenship through a U.S. citizen parent, or Naturalization certificate issued to a person who became a U.S. citizen after 18 years of age through the naturalization process The Consular Report of Birth Abroad or Certification of Birth should be obtained by persons who were born abroad to U.S. citizens. If you cannot present primary evidence of U.S. citizenship, you may be able to substitute secondary evidence of U.S. citizenship, as described by the U.S. Department of State. Under the legal principle of "birthright citizenship," as established in 1868 by the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution and confirmed by the US Supreme Court in the 1898 case of U.S. v. Wong Kim Ark, all persons born in the United States, are already full U.S. citizens. Also, persons born outside of the United States may already be U.S. citizens if one or both of their parents were U.S. citizens—by either birth or naturalization—at the time. People in this category may apply through the U.S. Customs and Immigration Service (USCIS) for a Certificate of Citizenship that will serve as proof of their U.S. citizenship status. Persons who cannot present primary evidence of U.S. citizenship may submit secondary evidence of U.S. citizenship. Acceptable forms of proof of secondary evidence of U.S. citizenship depend on the appropriate situations as described below. Persons born in the United States but unable to present primary evidence of U.S. citizenship may submit a combination of early public records as evidence of their U.S. citizenship. Early public records must be submitted with a Letter of No Record. Early public records should show name, date of birth, place of birth, and preferably be created within the first five years of the person's life. Examples of early public records are: Baptismal certificate/Hospital birth certificate/Census record/Early school record/Family Bible record/Doctor's record of postnatal care Early public records are not acceptable when presented alone. Persons born in the United States but unable to present primary evidence of U.S. citizenship because their U.S. Birth Certificate was not filed within the first year after their birth may submit a Delayed U.S. Birth Certificate. A Delayed U.S. Birth Certificate filed more than one year after your birth may be acceptable if: It lists the documentation used to create it (preferably early public records, and it's signed by the birth attendant or lists an affidavit signed by the parents. If the Delayed U.S. Birth Certificate does not include these items, it should be submitted together with Early Public Records. Persons born in the United States but unable to present primary evidence of U.S. citizenship because they do not have a previous U.S. passport or a certified U.S. birth certificate of any kind must present a state-issued Letter of No Record showing: Name/Date of birth/The years for which a birth record was searched/Acknowledgment that no birth certificate was found on file A Letter of No Record must be submitted together with early public records. Persons born in the United States but unable to present primary evidence of U.S. citizenship, you may submit Form DS-10: Birth Affidavit as evidence of your U.S. citizenship. The birth affidavit must be notarized. Must be submitted together with early public records. Must be completed by an affiant who has personal knowledge of the birth in the U.S. Must state briefly how the affiant's knowledge was acquired. Should be completed by an older blood relative. NOTE: If no older blood relative is available, it may be completed by the attending physician or any other person who has personal knowledge of the person's birth. Persons who claim citizenship through birth abroad to U.S. citizen parent(s), but are unable to submit a Consular Report of Birth Abroad or Certification of Birth must submit all of the following: Foreign birth certificate (translated into English)/Evidence of citizenship of the person's U.S. citizen parent/Parents' marriage certificate/a statement of the person's U.S. citizen parent detailing all periods and places of residence or physical presence in the United States and abroad before their birth The following will not be accepted as secondary evidence of U.S. citizenship: Voter registration card/Army discharge paper/Social Security Card/Planning to apply for British citizenship? In the UK, different situations require different forms of identification. There are widely recognised guidelines to ensure that your ID is valid. This guide will help you understand when IDs are accepted and when they might need to be notarised or legalised. Commonly Accepted Forms of ID in the UK The type of ID you need can vary depending on where you're using it, but most contexts require a government-issued document/card containing your photo and date of expiry. Below, you'll find the most widely accepted forms of ID in the UK. Passport A valid UK or international passport is almost always accepted as proof of identity and nationality. Whether you're travelling abroad, starting a new job or visiting an age-restricted venue, you can use your passport as proof of ID. It's essential to make sure your passport hasn't expired. For some purposes, like international travel or visa applications, you'll need an expiry date of at least three or six months in the future. Requirements for Validity To be accepted as a valid form of ID, your document must meet these basic conditions: Current and Not Expired - Your ID must be up to date. Expired passports or driving licences are rarely accepted. (There are certain exceptions during the COVID-19 pandemic). Clear and Legible - The ID document must be clear and unaltered. IDs that are damaged, faded, or modified will not be accepted. Photo Matching - For IDs with photos, such as passports and driving licences, you must still resemble your photo, especially if it's an older ID. Official Issue - The ID must be an official document issued by a recognised government or authority (like the UK Passport Office, the DVLA for driving licences, or similar bodies for national identity cards). When You Might Need Your ID Notarised You may need notarisation for your ID if it has been requested by parties in another country. This will involve providing the notary with your original ID such as your passport, driving licence or ID card. To prove British citizenship, individuals will need to provide: A British passport which details you are a British citizen. However, when an individual does not have a valid passport, there are other ways to prove they are a British citizen. They will need to show or be able to prove one of the following: A birth certificate if the individual was born prior to 1st of January 1983; if an individual was born after this date they are required to prove their parents had right of abode at the time of your birth or they were UK citizens; if an individual was born overseas, they will have to prove their parents were British and eligible to pass on their citizenship to them. Their long form birth certificate/certificate of naturalisation/British citizenship ceremony registration certificate. Regardless of the form it comes in, your identity documents should always remain valid and up to date, for the duration of your stay in the UK but as a general rule of thumb it must be noted that the above cannot be used as travel documents, as you will be denied entry into the UK if you try to use these documents instead of a valid passport. Having a passport is the most secure and legal way of entering the UK. British Citizenship grants you permanent residence in Britain without imposed immigration restrictions. It's necessary that you obtain British citizenship to obtain the UK passport. All Britain's residents have the right to reside within the United Kingdom. Several Commonwealth residents also have a right of residence. Usually your UK passport will show your British citizenship or your right of residence. A valid British passport, or a UK passport that includes the Channel Islands, Isle of Man or Ireland; EU or other nationalities passport; Passports of non-EU nationals, containing UK stamps, a visa or a UK residence permit showing the immigration status of the holder in the UK; A current UK or European photo-card driving licence; A national ID card and/or other valid documentation relating to immigration status and permission of work; UK full or provisional photo-card driving licence. The documents required to apply to be a British citizen are as follows: Proof of identity such as a valid passport, driving licence, birth certificate, Home Office travel document; Biometric residence permit (BRP); a passed Life in the UK test certificate; Proof of B1 level in English speaking, writing, listening and reading if applicable; Proof of lawful residence in the UK during your visa duration or qualifying period; Detailed explanation of any period of absence in the UK during your qualifying or visa duration; Proof that you currently hold Indefinite Leave to Remain status. If your British passport says anything other than GBR, you are either: A British Overseas Territories Citizen (BOTC) meaning you will be required to register for UK citizenship; A British national who will most likely not be eligible for citizenship. Indefinite Leave for Remain or ILR is a route to permanent residency or settled status. This gives you a permanent residence in Britain, letting you reside and work within the UK without limitations. British Citizenship can be obtained by a foreign national after they have settled in the UK and applied for citizenship. The status of British citizen is also automatically given to children born in the UK to a British parent. This is called citizenship by birth. A citizen of the UK will receive a British passport which enables the freedom to travel exempt of immigration limitations, the right to live, work, and study in the country, access to healthcare and public funds, the right to vote, and so on. You can check whether you are British by registering with a government website, checking whether you were born in the UK to British citizens, or checking your passport. You may be eligible to British citizenship by descent. Because each individual application is different, it is difficult to determine an exact time frame in which British Citizenship applications can be handled. The Home Office state the application process will take six months from receiving the application. It applies in all cases to British citizenship, including citizenship by birth, British citizenship from descent and British citizenship by double descent from a grandparent.
