BBC The BBC is one of the most used news apps in the world, and this may be due to the fact that the BBC is a global name in news, but also because it has a small app with a couple of bells and whistles. The homepage is like a giant tower of rotating articles: each section receives a line and then you toss it around looking for the one you're interested in. You can customize the sound for push notifications and you can set whether or not the application can update in the background and whether you want to receive a notification when it does. You can't, however, set whether you only update on Wifi rather than use your valuable mobile data, so I prefer the nice big update button on the top bar. Huffington Post It is a source of liberal inclination, but damn it if their application is not just about perfect. The Huffington Post will allow you access, but it's not intrusive if you don't want to. You can have your own custom edition, and easily go through the various editions around the world. You can change the fonts to your liking, like everyone else, but you know Does the Huffington Post special? It has a dark mode. And he doesn't have only one, he has two: it's dark and he's night. Even better, you can automatically activate the night mode according to the ambient light sensor, so that it will change according to your environment. This makes me want to tiffare: it is so rareWonderful to find a news app that does not want to blind its readers with tons of white. Beyond the dark, Huffpo has some other fun things. You can customize push notifications with a specific ringtone and decide whether it vibrates or not. It can automatically download items on a range of choice and has the option to download only via WiFi, for data-conscious users. ABC News ABC News is another rare news app with a dark theme, and has something even more rare: Chromecast support. You can launch video segments directly from the app to your TV, allowing you to approach my own little personal dream to simply launch custom playlists like your newscasts. ABC has a customizable silent mode, supposing enabling push notifications for this, and also allows location-based notifications for more localized results for particular news in your region. ABC News frequently has one or more current live streams, which is particularly useful for hearing things like press conferences or breaking news cuts while away from home or in an incredibly noisy editorial. You can also rewatch sections from popular ABC news programs such as world news and this week. The app also gives you a daily rewind at any time of the day you prefer. AP, Associated Press, is one of the news sources that most other news organizations sign up and the lucky thing is that using the AP app, you can get this news faster in some cases, especially if you head to the release section press. Be aware, however, the press release section does not have a real filter, so you may need to sift versions for entertainment and sports while looking for printed communication. You can also report news for AP through the app if you are a person who does that kind of thing. USA Today this app is another app with a lot of white, but not without its merits. The layout of today's USA is great, which is not a bad thing with all the adorable images, but it means that you will scroll more than on a more condensed layout. The sections and subsections are well done and easy to navigate, but the settings leave something to be desired. Offline reading for the USA app Today is also a bit different, since you need to select it from the drop-down menu and thenmanually the download while it is still present on the wifi for the next reading, so if you forgot to synchronize before you train, you're sol. The Guardian this app is almost offensively white, but the design elements, the animations and the fluid nature of the app almost compensate. The guardian manages to break some of white with colored blocks, especially the bright red boxes with live blog. Usually it's one in the news section and one in the sports section, and they're one of the best live blogs I've seen done in a mobile app so far. Like the BBC, you can update automatically, but you can't indicate if you update via Wifi only. New York Times The New York Times is one of the country's leading newspapers, and as such, has an award for its content. Subscriptions for NYT can range from \$14.99 a month to a whopping \$34.99 a month, and while most of us just can't afford to pay that for a news app, the Times is worth it to many, and for the price you pay, you're getting a decent app. You have settings for background syncing via Wi-Fi only and you have a night mode (huzzah). Browsing sections in the app can be a bit boring, if for no other reason than the list of sections is huge, but unless you're spending a lot of time blogging, you should be fine.
