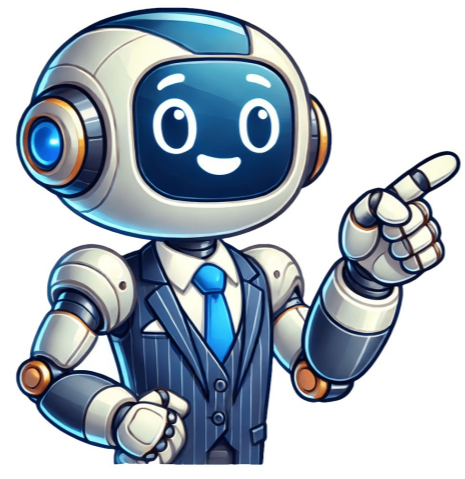


I'm not a robot



The National Schools Awards will return to the House of Lords on December 3rd, 2025, marking another year of celebrating excellence in education. The event, sponsored by Reed, aims to recognize the hard work and dedication of teaching professionals who have overcome challenges during the pandemic. With eight categories, including Governor of the Year and School of the Year, nominations are now closed. Ticket holders will need to bring their entry ticket, photo ID, and undergo a security check upon entry. The dress code is formal business attire, and all ticket holders will enjoy complimentary drinks and canapés. To get a ticket, apply through the Tes Schools Awards website or complete an enquiry form. The ceremony takes place in the Cholmondeley Room and Terrace at the House of Lords, overlooking Parliament Building and the River Thames. The event is free to enter and comprises 23 categories, including the new Inclusive Trust of the Year award. Four new judges have been added to the panel, aiming to share best practice and celebrate the vital work of schools, of education. "The shortlisted entries provide a benchmark of what is possible in the sector and, through the awards, that work is shared so all schools in the UK can benefit and learn from each other," he says. "The awards also send a really clear signal to the wider public - and to politicians - that this is a sector that changes lives and that is constantly innovating to ensure the best outcomes for children and young people." The categories include: 1 Pastoral Care Champion Raising confident young people ready to live up to their potential requires attention to more than their education. We're looking for recommendations for pastoral care that exceeds expectations - whether it's a one-to-one tutoring system that can spot problems like bullying before they develop, or a network of support which wraps around students to make sure they are thoroughly supported in mind, body and spirit. 2 Mind Champion Many parents' number one concern is whether their child is feeling OK. The pressures of the modern world and social media in particular are leading to worrying increases in the amount of children reporting anxiety and depression. We'd like to hear what steps schools are taking to ensure that those students who are struggling get the best possible support. 3 Sustainability Champion Our Green Champion will be a school where environmental awareness is a verb, not a noun. With the astonishing range of eco-endavours underway, schools will have to impress the judges with a really innovative plan, which puts sustainability and green concerns at the heart of the operation. 4 Animal Support Champion (Sponsored by Farms for City Children) School House believes animals of all shapes and sizes belong in our Independent schools are taking their charitable work more seriously than ever before, with many partnering with local academies and primaries to share resources and even lessons. This collaboration is a signifier of change in the sector, as independent schools strive to widen their charitable purpose and make a positive impact on their communities. Students at many schools are also benefiting from volunteering opportunities that take them out of their comfort zone. Whether it's an orphanage in Cape Town or an elderly persons' home in London, these experiences can have a profound impact on young people and teach them the value of doing good for others. The Independent Schools of the Year awards 2025 will celebrate the demonstrable benefits of an independent school education and showcase the innovative, caring and life-enhancing student experience. The awards programme has become well-established and is now one of the leading awards in the sector, providing national and international recognition that drives public profile and enquiries from prospective parents. This year's awards will focus on celebrating the unique strengths of each school community, with 25 award categories designed to capture and highlight stories of great work being undertaken across the independent school landscape. From educational technology to travel and service, there is a category for every aspect of school life that makes an impact. The Independent Schools of the Year 2025 awards are now open for entries, with a deadline of July 10th. The winners will be announced in October, and we encourage all schools to submit their entries and share their individual stories. Congratulations to all our well-deserved winners, who shone bright at this year's Tes Schools Awards. The UK's most inspiring schools, teachers and trusts have been named at the awards, now in their 17th year. The best in state and independent schools across early years settings, primary and secondary are recognised here. In the academies sector, Harris Federation in London won Trust of the Year, while Canonium Learning Trust in Essex took home the award for smaller trusts. Oasis Academy South Bank was crowned Secondary School of the Year, while Louise Edgerton from Hyndland Secondary School in Glasgow, Scotland, took the title of State Headteacher of the Year. Sue Woodroffe, from The Grammar School at Leeds won independent headteacher of the year, and Professor Barnaby Lenon, former head of Harrow School and former chair of the Independent Schools Council, won the Lifetime Achievement Award. The awards, which celebrate 23 award categories, were announced at a gala ceremony last night. Commenting on the awards, Rod Williams, CEO of Tes said: "A special congratulations to all the winners and finalists at this year's Tes Schools Awards. The remarkable achievements of state and independent schools, teachers, and trusts that were celebrated this evening are a powerful demonstration of the excellence and dedication driving UK education."
